FH1: WIRE KNITTED ROCK BRACELET

with Paula Rudnick Friday: 9am-noon

Class description: Learn to knit with wire and make a

bracelet incorporating stone beads.

Materials fee: \$25 includes everything you need:

wire, stones, wooden needles, and beads. **Skill level:** Must know basic knit and purl.

Max # of students: 18

HALF-DAY WORKSHOPS



FH2: WET FELT AN ORNAMENTAL ART VESSEL

with Lyndy Runyon Friday: 9am-noon

Class description: This is a fun and imaginative introduction to wet felting. Students will be introduced to the shrinking properties of wool to trap and secure other fibers, fabrics and materials for texture and personality. You will then create a sculptural vessel.

Materials fee: \$45 includes all materials

Supply list: Bring bath towel • black marker • ruler or tape measure • water bucket or bowl • scissors • large sponge. **Skill level:** Beginner and up **Max # of students:** 10



FH3: LEARN TO SPIN USING A TURKISH DROP

SPINDLE with Julie Drogsvold Friday: 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: This workshop will explore creating yarns using the lovely and versatile Turkish spindle. Students will learn and practice using the spindle as both a drop style and supported type spindle. All experience levels are welcome.

Materials fee: \$35 includes a Turkish spindle for you to keep

and fiber for class.

Skill level: Beginners and up **Max # of students:** 18



FH4: CREATE A WET-FELTED PILLOW TOP

with Lyndy Runyon

Friday: 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: Students will learn to use "resists" to keep the pillow sides from attaching to each other. You will use the interlocking properties of wool fibers to show off the shiny properties of silk. Closure ideas will be shown and shared. You will take the wet pillow home to stuff and finish.

Materials fee: \$45 includes a 14" X 14" pillow insert, black merino wool top, silk fibers and silk caps, novelty yarns, soap, plastic and bubble wrap, old silk fabrics and use of instructor's felting tools.

Supply list: Bring bath towel • 18"-24" pool noodle • tape measure • water container (quart yogurt container size) • sponge. Bring any fibers you want to insert; students are encouraged to bring wool yarns, silk threads and old silk scarves to add to their surface designs.

Skill level: Some felting experience

FRIDAY: APRIL 5 FULL-DAY WORKSHOPS



FF1: SHIBORI DYEING with Terri Hamstra

Friday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: You will learn the basics of building an indigo vat and several different shibori resist methods to prepare fabric for dyeing, such as *Itajima* (folding and clamping), Ne-Maki (binding), Arashi (pole winding), Ori Nui (fold/stitch), and Mokume (wood grain).

Materials fee: \$40 includes 4 cotton napkins, 1 silk scarf, and all supplies needed for class.

Supply list: Bring old clothes to wear • apron • dishwashing

or thicker rubber gloves • notebook and pen.

Skill level: Beginner and up **Max # of students:** 10





FF3: TENERIFFE WEAVING ON A GOURD

with Shelley Rogers Fletcher and Diane Rogers Friday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: You will be provided with a large gourd shard prepped and cleaned. You will use ink dyes to color the gourd and be instructed on the basics of gourd weaving in the teneriffe style, including layout of the warp and various stitch patterns to be added along with bead embellishments. You will either finish your piece during class time or be provided enough materials to take home to complete the project. Materials fee: \$90 includes: Prepped gourd shard, handout, inks, nitrile gloves, heat guns, sealants and brushes as necessary (sprays if warm enough and brush-on sealer if too cool to go outside to spray), pencils, drills, awls, weaving threads (waxed linen) in assorted colors, needles, beads, leather lacing for hanging or embellishments, scissors, etc.

Supply list: Everything will be provided, but if you wish, bring your own: scissors for cutting threads • pencil for marking on gourd and taking notes on handout • beads for embellishments (must be relatively small but big enough hole for 4-ply waxed linen to pass through.)

Skill level: Beginner Max # of students: 20



FF2: THE ART OF KANTHA EMBROIDERY

with Debbi Brunner

Friday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class Description: Learn the art of Kantha hand-sewing techniques, a style originally designed to conserve and recycle worn fabrics, using three simple stitches. During class you will create a tri-fold or drawstring bag; patterns will be provided. Kantha embroidery can be used to make interesting motifs and textures suitable for garment accents, shawls, bags, and home décor. You will learn the stitches, draw designs to embroider, and have a bag to use when you finish. As with all hand sewing, you will enjoy a relaxing day while learning a playful and useful needle art.

Materials fee: \$2 includes instructions for sewing two bags, designs, and stitch diagrams.

Supply list: You are encouraged to work with recycled fabrics and scraps. Of course you may work with new fabric, but it is very exciting to use your "stash".

Bring: 1 fat quarter for exterior fabric; lightweight cotton or linen with a subtle or solid background is best to show your embroidery motifs • 1 solid or print coordinating cotton fat quarter for lining fabric • 12" x 18" cotton muslin for interlining • sewing thread near the color of the main fabric to complete bag binding and assembly • 6 skeins cotton floss for Kantha stitches: 1 color close to exterior fabric color and 5 colors that you love to compliment exterior fabric and perhaps coordinate with lining print • floss winder cards: one for each floss color • needles: crewel needles sizes 7-8 • marking pens and pencils: disappearing pens and/or chalk • ruler, tape measure • scissors for fabric • small scissors for embroidery threads • thimble if you are used to wearing one • paper, pencil, and eraser for drawing designs and taking notes • a spiral notebook, which is perfect for an idea book

Skill level: Beginner to experienced sewing with a needle and thread **Max # of students:** 10

FF4: SPINNING DYED TOP: ONE TOP, MANY WAYS

with Janet Deutmeyer

Friday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: You bought beautiful stripe-dyed roving that called your name. How are you going to spin it so it doesn't look like mud? Do your yarns seem similar in looks? These are just a couple of things we will be covering in class. We'll spin dyed top into various different-looking yarns. We'll mix colors to see how they play off each other. Come to explore, play, and have fun spinning.

Materials fee: \$45.00 includes all fiber and a handout.

Supply List: Bring a spinning wheel in good working order • at least 3 bobbins • lazy kate • note-taking items • labels • skein

ties • niddy noddy • sample bags, and any other items you need for spinning.

Skill Level: Advanced beginner Max # of students 20

SAH1: VIKING KNIT A BRACELET with Paula Rudnick

Saturday: 9am-noon

Class description: Learn the art of Viking knitting and make a bracelet with wire.

Materials fee: \$45 includes wire, dowel, awl, closures, end caps and draw plate.

Supply list: Bring magnifying glasses, if needed, or safety glasses • extra light if desired • personal jewelry tools (please put your name on the tools) such as pliers, crimpers, wire cutters, etc. However, all these tools will also be available for use in class.

Skill level: Beginner. Max # of students: 15



SAH2: DORSET BUTTONS with Deborah Jarchow

Saturday: 9am-noon

Class description: Learn to make beautiful matching buttons for your hand-crafted wearables. Or create your own delightful decorations for the holidays or anytime! By using bits of yarn, sparkly thread, a few beads, and plastic or metal rings, you are able to fashion what will soon become treasured family heirlooms. After learning the basic technique, you can make the disks into beautiful accessories, including necklaces, bracelets, hair clips, rings, and other adornments. You can create a huge variety of buttons simply by changing the size of your base ring, the thread you use, and the pattern in which you wrap the thread.

Materials fee: \$15 for a kit that includes everything you need to get started, both to make a couple of buttons as well as ornaments: Embroidery and sewing needles, 1" plastic ring, 5/8" plastic ring, 2" welded metal ring, 1 1/2" book ring, 3/2 cotton for button, beads, variety of shiny yarn, sparkly yarn, 3/2, 5/2, and Kreinik threads.

Supply list: Bring scissors and print the handout that will be sent to you prior to class.

Skill level: All Max # of students: 12

SAH3: DYEING: DISCHARGING T-SHIRTS AND


FABRIC with Merry Warner

Saturday: 9am-noon

Class description: Learn how to discharge color using bleach and Soft Scrub to create designs on T-shirts and fabric. You will learn various techniques utilizing stamps, stencils, cut-out papers, etc to achieve a variety of patterns. Materials fee: \$20 includes use of spray bottles, bleach, Soft Scrub, 2-3 T-shirts, fabric, stencils, stamps, lace paper, white chalk, fabric paint, plastic gloves, and masks.

Supply list: Bring extra T-shirts or fabric if you wish. They must be 100% cotton in darker colors to achieve contrast; do not bring red or lighter colors.

Skill level: All levels Max # of students: 25





SAH5: HOW TO READ AND KNIT JAPANESE LACE PATTERNS with Diane Braun

Saturday: 1:30-4:30pm

Class Description: You will learn to "read" Japanese lace knitting symbols while knitting a headband incorporating 2 different patterns.

Materials fee: \$2 includes a handout of some patterns and a bibliography.

Supply list: Bring size 6 U.S. (4.0mm) 16" circular knitting needles (preferably metal with sharp points) • 100 yds of smooth, solid color, sport weight yarn: wool, wool blend, or stretchy acrylic—not 100% cotton • stitch marker • 2 cable needles • tapestry needle • notebook and pen.

Skill level: Students must know how to knit, purl, and work in the round.

Homework: Cast on 112 stitches. Join into a circle, being careful not to twist. Place stitch marker. Knit 2 rounds.

Max # of students: 16



SAH4: A SMORGASBORD OF WEAVING

TECHNIQUES with Judith Shangold

Saturday: 9am-noon

Class description: Jazz up your plain weave with a series of techniques: Alternating and blending colors, hatching, weaving angles and curves, soumak, and leno lace.

Materials fee: \$2 for printed handout

Supply list: Bring a warped 8" or wider rigid heddle or other loom with at least 2 shafts • 2 or more shuttles • pick-up stick • tapestry beater or kitchen fork • scissors • and a variety of weft yarns that coordinate with your warp. Bring colors from the same side of the color wheel as your warp color and at least a couple of colors from the opposite side of the wheel. Feel free to bring yarns of different weights and textures.

Homework: Dress the loom with a 6" wide, 2½ yd warp with yarn appropriate for a scarf. Use a 10- or 12-dent heddle/reed, if possible, with the appropriate weight yarn to achieve a balanced weave. Weave in your header and be ready to start weaving.

Skill level: Advanced beginner and above

SAH6: WEAVE A RIBBON BASKET

with Deborah Jarchow Saturday: 1:30-4:30pm

Class description: These captivating baskets are fun to make, decorative, and useful! With no prior experience necessary, you will fashion your own vessel from ordinary supplies. Learn the basic set-up to weave the ribbon container and how to finish it off with ease.

Materials fee: \$15 includes everything you need.

Skill level: All Max # of students: 12

SAH7: ECO-DYEING WITH LEAVES, TEA, & ONION

SKINS with Merry Warner Saturday: 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: Learn how to prepare your items for printing and how to design the layout of leaves and other organic materials. Teacher will demonstrate how to wrap the items into a cylindrical shape for steaming. You will have time to print a couple of silk scarves and a pack of paper.

Materials fee: \$25 includes silk scarf blanks, silk fabric pieces, paper, assorted leaves, onion skins, and tea, as well as all tools and equipment needed for class.

Supply list: Bring extra silk scarves and sample fabric pieces if you wish.

Skill level: No experience needed Max # of students: 25



SAH8: BEADED KUMIHIMO NECKLACE

(OR BRACELET) with Sue Helle

Saturday: 1:30-4:30pm

Class description: You will learn to thread your beads to create the pattern and get a start on braiding your necklace or bracelet. You will finish the project at home.

Materials fee: None. C-lon will be provided. Endcaps will be available for purchase if needed.

Supply list: Bring a new kumihimo foam disk (a used one is fine as long as it's only been used with C-lon or S-lon, nothing thicker) • center weight • 8 weighted bobbins • 5 colors of size 8 seed beads (1 tube each color) • beading mat • beading scoop • C-lon and endcaps if you have them.

Skill level: Advanced beginner-intermediate braider

Max # of students: 15

SATURDAY: APRIL 6 FULL-DAY WORKSHOPS



SAF1: CREATE A NUNO FELT MERINO/SILK SCARF with Lyndy Runyon

Saturday: 9am-noon; 1:30 - 4:30pm

Class description: Students will learn to layer silk hankies over silk gauze and blend merino top wool with pieces of vintage silk scarves to create spectacular textures and color harmonies. Layering the fibers on silk mesh will allow the fabric to show through as a component, and students will learn to control felting direction to create texture. We will explore the use of the selvedges to create ruffling and texture. Every participant will leave with a broader understanding of directional shrinking, texturizing of the silk fibers, and use of vintage silk scarves for interest.

Materials fee: \$70: Each participant will receive their choice of colorway silk scarf, silk hankies, fiber pack, and merino wool. Students should e-mail lyndyrunyon@gmail.com to choose from these colorways: Blue/purple/green or red/burgundy/rust or gold/green/rust. Novelty fibers and vintage silk scarves to cut up and design with will be available. Teacher will provide plastic sheet, soap, bubble wrap, and felting tools for use during class.

Supply list: Bring an 18" or 24" pool noodle • two-quart bucket for water • 2 regular bath towels • 2-4 hand towels • old T-shirt cut into ties or strips • scissors • cookie sheet • bamboo placemat • washboard if available. Students are encouraged to bring and add their own fibers — alpaca, silk, merino wool, mohair, etc — should they have a design or color scheme in mind. **Skill level:** Some felting experience, including if having taken either of Friday's felting classes. **Max # of students:** 10

SATURDAY: APRIL 6 FULL-DAY WORKSHOPS- continued



SAF2: COTTON SPINNING MADE EASY with Julie Drogsvold

Saturday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm - 4:30pm

Class description: Learn how to adjust your wheel for short-staple fibers and how the long draw works best for spinning cotton. Students will spin cotton from the seed, card ginned cotton into punis to spin, and then spin natural-colored cotton sliver. We will also cover plying, blending color and other fibers into your cotton to produce wildly unique yarns, as well as tips for care and use of your handspun cotton yarns.

Materials fee: \$20.00 includes cotton lint, cotton sliver (Upland and Pima), puni stick.

Supply List: Bring the following: Spinning wheel or e-spinner, ideally flyer-driven with Scotch tension • carders-cotton carders preferred, but wool will do • lazy kate and 3 empty bobbins • tags and marking pen for labeling • niddy noddy • pillow for chair to give back support or raise seat.

Optional: Favorite spinning chair, charkha, support spindle or Tahkli, ball winder.

Skill Level: Students should have a good working relationship with their wheel and be capable of spinning a

consistent single. Max # of students: 14

SUF1: LEARN TO WEAVE ON A RIGID HEDDLE LOOM AND MAKE A SCARF with Deborah Jarchow Sunday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm.

Class Description: Weaving on a rigid heddle loom is easy to learn, portable and a great way to create interesting fabric with yarn you might already have in your stash. You will learn how to thread your loom and weave cloth while making a lovely scarf. We will cover weaving terminology and also explore a special technique called Clasped Weft that creates diagonal designs in the cloth.

Materials fee: A limited number of looms are available from Deborah for rent on a first come, first reserved basis. Rental fee: \$20. Please email Deborah at djweaves@me.com to check loom availability and to reserve a loom. Starred items in the supply list are included with loom rental.

Supply list: Bring: *Rigid heddle loom with at least 8" weaving width • stand for it, if you have one • *clamps • *warping peg • *7.5- or 8-dent reed • *sley/threading hook • *shuttle • scissors • tapestry needle • tube from inside a paper towel roll • 2 brown paper grocery bags • measuring tape • 350 yds smooth, strong, non-hairy, about worsted-weight yarn that is at least 2 ply. Also bring 50-75 yds each of two different contrasting colors of lighter-weight yarn (light worsted or dk weight). **Homework:** Print the handout which will be sent to you prior to class.

SUF2: SPINNING: BUILD YOUR OWN BLENDING BOARD TO CREATE & SPIN ART BATTS

with Julie Drogsvold

Sunday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class Description: Would you like to make bright, fun, and textured art batts, and then spin those batts into amazing yarn? This class will provide all the tools and materials needed to build a blending board of your very own during class and instruction on how to use that board to make art batts from a variety of fibers and materials. Students will then creatively spin batts in a thick and thin manner to create one-of-a-kind singles and plied yarn.

Materials fee: \$105 includes all materials needed to build a blending board of your own and to spin rolags in class.

Supply list: Bring spinning wheel • lazy kate and 3 empty

bobbins • niddy noddy.

Skill level: Students should have a good working relationship with their wheel and be capable of spinning a consistent

single. Max # of students: 14







SUF3: WEAVE A BASKET WITH FLAT AND ROUND REED with Gail Kretz

Sunday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm -4:30pm

Class description: Students will receive a pre-woven base so that they can focus on side and rim weaving and have a completely finished basket by the end of the course. Students will personalize their baskets by choosing a center design from several templates as well as colors of dyed reed. Learn flat and round reed weaving techniques as well as a unique lashing and finishing skill. The completed basket will be approximately 10" high and 11" in diameter.

Materials fee: \$50 includes all materials and tools needed

Skill level: All Max # of students: 10

SUNDAY: APRIL 7 FULL-DAY WORKSHOPS - continued



SUF4: LEARN TO WEAVE ON A TINY FRAME LOOM with Lucy Jennings

Sunday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: Students will create a miniature weaving inside a wooden frame, so when the weaving is done it's ready to hang! This workshop is for beginners, and emphasis will be on the calming nature of weaving and exploration without fear of mistakes. The frame loom will come strung and ready to weave. You will choose yarns and colors from the instructor's stash—wools, cottons, and specialty fibers.

Materials fee: \$35 includes 4" X 4.5" frame loom, tapestry needles, yarn, hanging cord, carry bag

Skill level: Beginner Max # of students: 15



SUF5: WEAVE A SAKIORI SCARF with Amanda Robinette

Sunday: 9am-noon; 1:30pm-4:30pm

Class description: Sakiori weaving is a form of Japanese rag weaving used to make durable, warm cloth for work garments and other utilitarian textiles. Western Sakiori uses this method to create beautiful and useful textiles from discarded luxury materials. Recycle your old silk garments and scarves, or visit your local thrift shop to collect materials. Bring them to class along with your rigid heddle or other loom threaded per instructions you will receive prior to class. Further instructions about materials that are good to collect will also be sent. You will learn how to prepare your fabrics and then start your weaving.

Materials Fee: None
